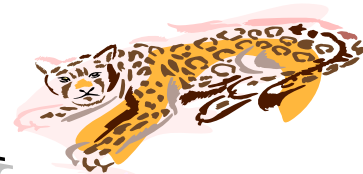

Student DROP-OFF

Parents please do not leave your car unattended in the drop-off lane. If you want to walk your child to the door, park first.

Please use the drop-off lane if you are not walking your child to the door. I have seen children walking through the parking lot unattended. Let's avoid an unnecessary accident by putting our children's safety first. It may take a little longer and a little more patience, but it's the best thing for all of us!

Beliefs & Values

What determines who among our children are going to become high achieving adults? Did great doctors, musicians, artists, and scientists reach the top of their professions because they were born with more talent and ability than others, or is it because they received special training and encouragement?

The answer to that question is both. Research clearly shows that innate talent and ability alone will not determine a person's level of success. Most people have the potential to excel; however, only a small percentage actually do. Proper support and encouragement (especially from parents) can make a huge difference in the development of a child's talents and in academic achievement.

When asked by researchers to look back on their childhood years, a group of more than 100 high achieving adults from a wide variety of backgrounds stated how their parent played a crucial role in their development. Four common guidelines were present in each of these families.

Values: Families placed high value on education and hard work. Parents modeled for their children that success came as a result of hard work. Projects that were started were finished. Taking responsibility was valued at school as well as home.

Curiosity – All of the high achievers remembered how their parents encouraged curiosity and exploration. Questions were encouraged and answered seriously. When parents didn't know the answer to a question, the children were taught how to find one.

Reading – Reading was modeled in the home, and family trips to the library were a regular occurrence.

Play – Children were encouraged to be creative and imaginative. Board and card games were a favorite way for parents and children to play together. These parents also were aware of their child's areas of interest and were able to add support and encouragement to these areas.

I believe that parents play an integral part in their child's development and contribute significantly to their child's educational achievement. Thank you for taking part in your child's education by supporting the work we do at Thomas Jefferson School.

A View From My Office

As I approached the high school doors, it hadn't occurred to me that this was an incredibly significant night. Sure, it was just the parent open house at my daughter, Emily's high school. How many open houses and parent orientations had my wife and I attended over the years for both my son and daughter? The exact number isn't important now, however I never remember missing even one.

I picked up my daughter's schedule and school map. Tonight, parents walk the hallways and follow their child's schedule. We attend mini classes (10 minutes each), hear about school expectations and meet the teachers. I no longer feel intimidated by the size and layout of the school. I pretty much know where I am going and how to get to the various classrooms. As I walk down the hallways, I feel very nostalgic. I enjoy the feeling of walking in my daughter's footsteps.

It really doesn't seem that long ago that our children were in elementary school. I vividly remember attending kindergarten music programs, parent-teacher conferences, Cub Scout meetings, and fun fairs. I loved coming to my children's elementary school, attending activities, and meeting their teachers. I wanted to let the teachers know that my wife and I were always available and approachable and that we were partners with them for our child's betterment. In those early days, my wife volunteered in the classroom, as an extra set of hands for the teacher. We went on field trips, helped at fun fairs, and I even gave a talk on Abraham Lincoln to my daughter's 5th grade class.

My wife and I have always tried to be involved in our children's education. We know that there are many opportunities for parent participation and we enjoy being at school. It sends an important message to our children: "We feel that what you are doing at school is important and we fully support you in this."

I continued walking down the high school hallway and turned into my daughter's American Studies classroom. This is a senior honor's class and surprisingly there are quite a few parents in the classroom. I say hello to the teacher and take my seat next to the other parents. As the teacher speaks, I drift away for a short time. I think about how this is Emily's last year in high school. This is the last year we will have a child in the public school system. I think about all the activities she will be involved in this year: chorus concerts, madrigal dinner, participating in plays, college visits, and a drama field trip to Illinois State University. My wife and I are already scheduled to be chaperones for the High School Drama Festival. I think about all the years that my children have attended school and all the fun my wife and I have had supporting them in school. I know it's all going to change soon. I know Emily is going to enjoy her senior year. My wife and I will enjoy it too, but we will savor each moment, each activity, as Emily walks slightly ahead into her future.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Many Halloween related injuries can be prevented if parents closely supervise school-aged children during trick-or-treat activities and by following these safety tips from the American Academy of Pediatrics:

- Go only to well-lit houses and remain on porches rather than entering houses.
- Travel in small groups and be accompanied by an adult.
- Bring treats home before eating them so parents can inspect them.
- Use costume knives and swords that are flexible, not rigid or sharp.
- Wear clothing that is bright, reflective, and flame retardant.
- Use flashlights, stay on sidewalks and avoid crossing yards.
- Consider using face paint instead of masks (masks can obstruct a child's vision).
- Avoid wearing long, baggy costumes.

Creencias y valores

¿Qué define quien de nuestros hijos va a tener éxito? ¿A caso los grandes doctores, músicos, artistas y científicos llegaron a la cima porque nacieron con más talento y habilidad que los demás? ¿O fue porque recibieron tratamiento especial y aliento?

La respuesta es: las dos cosas. A sido claramente demostrado que el fijarse solamente en el talento y habilidad natural no define el nivel de éxito de una persona. La mayoría de la gente tiene el poder de sobresalir; sin embargo, solo un pequeño porcentaje lo hace. El apoyo y aliento (sobre todo de los padres) es lo que hace la mayor diferencia en el desarrollo del talento y el logro académico de un niño.

Cuando los investigadores pidieron a un grupo de 100 personas de gran éxito que pensarán en su infancia, todos dijeron que la influencia de sus padres fue lo que tuvo más significado en su desarrollo. Cada una de esas familias siguió estas 4 pautas:

Valores: Gran énfasis en estudiar y trabajar duro. Los padres dieron el ejemplo de cómo el éxito se logra a través de trabajar duro. Todo lo que se comienza, se termina. Tomar responsabilidad y ser responsable tanto en casa como en la escuela.

Curiosidad: Todas las grandes personas recuerdan como sus padres apoyaban su curiosidad y ganas de explorar. No solo los animaban a hacer preguntas sino que también las contestaban seriamente. Cuando no sabían la respuesta, los niños aprendieron como y donde buscarlas.

Lectura: La importancia de la lectura se aprendió por ejemplo en el hogar y visitas familiares a la biblioteca eran usuales.
